**Eighteen months before her death from tuberculosis on September 30th 1897, Thérèse experienced the darkening of her faith. In spite of this experience, she was content to endure her trial knowing it was vastly more important to be where and what God wanted her to be. For Thérèse, spiritual doubts were not stumbling blocks; she used them as stepping-stones.**

**Saint Thérèse said: "The greatest honour God can do a soul is not give it much, but to ask much of it."**

## The Little Flower Parish Raffle For three fantastic Prizes



Did you know... Yellow Quill First Nation is a Saulteaux Nation located 12 kms east of Rose Valley, Sask. Chief Yellow-quill signed an adhesion to Treaty 4 on August 24, 1876. There are approximately 2800 members who live on and off reserve. In March 2011, over 16,000 acres of Treaty Land Entitlement (TLE) lands were converted to reserve status by Canada. TLE land refers to land that was promised in Treaty 4 but never received by the Nation. Yellow Quill Bison Ranch (<https://yqfn.ca/yellow-quill-first-nation/projects/>) is owned and operated by the Yellow Quill First Nation.

## Pope Francis appeals for peace and restraint in Israel-Hamas war



Pope Francis appeals for peace in the Holy Land and says Israel has the right to defend itself, but affirms that violence cannot help achieve a lasting peace built on justice.  
Violence cannot lead to peace  
In his appeal, Pope Francis acknowledged that “it is the right of those who are attacked to defend themselves”. However, he expressed concern for the “total siege facing the Palestinians in Gaza, where there have also been many innocent victims.” Israel announced a “complete siege” on Gaza, promising to shut off access to electricity, food, water, and gas.  
The Pope invited both parties to restraint in hopes of reaching a solution to the war.  
“Terrorism and extremism do not help to reach a solution to the conflict between Israelis and Palestinians, but fuel hatred, violence, and revenge, causing suffering to both sides,” he said.  
Pope Francis concluded his appeal for peace in the Middle East with a call for fraternity and dialogue. “The Middle East does not need war but peace, a peace built on justice, dialogue, and the courage of fraternity,” he said.

### Reflection

There is something special going on in the readings today. The parable of the wedding banquet is a striking commentary by Jesus towards the Jewish people. The invited guests initially represent those Israelites who lost focus on their relationship with God, either by being bewitched by riches or ignoring the prophets. The people who are invited to the banquet in their place represent the Gentiles, meaning that Christ has come not only to the Jewish people but to the entire world. The guest caught without a wedding garment is understood to be someone who is not committed to a relationship with Christ. It is critically important to engage and dialogue with those of other religions and creeds to work towards building the kingdom of God, enabling all to have a relationship with Christ.
