

St. Thérèse



St. Therese suffered intensely from constant headaches and insomnia. She endured fits of fever and trembling and suffered cruel hallucinations. Experts had diagnosed her sickness as everything from a nervous breakdown to a kidney infection. None of the treatments helped. Then, on May 13, 1883, Therese turned her head to a statue of the Virgin near her bed, and prayed for a cure. *“Suddenly Mary’s face radiated kindness and love.”* Therese was cured.

St. Thérèse said:

“The loveliest masterpiece of the heart of God is the love of a Mother.”

Offering of the Mass



By virtue of the “communion of saints,” the Church commends the dead to God’s mercy and offers her prayers especially the holy sacrifice of the Eucharist, on their behalf. (Catechism of the Catholic Church). This practice dates as far back as Judas collecting a sin-offering for the dead, making atonement so they might be delivered from their sin. (2 Maccabees 12:39-45). Masses may also be offered for the intentions of the living or in thanksgiving. Masses are requested through the parish office.

Readings for Corpus Christi

- **First Reading** – [Genesis 14:18-20](#): Melchizedek, king of Salem and priest of God, brought bread and wine and blessed Abram. Abram gave Melchizedek a tenth of everything.
- **Responsorial Psalm** – [Psalm 110](#): The LORD declares an eternal priesthood in the line of Melchizedek, promises victory over enemies, and assures divine authority and power.
- **Second Reading** – [1 Corinthians 11:23-26](#): Jesus instituted the Eucharist at the Last Supper, saying the bread is his body and the cup is the new covenant in his blood, to be done in remembrance of him.
- **Gospel** – [Luke 9:11B-17](#): Jesus fed a crowd of five thousand with five loaves and two fish. He blessed and broke the food, distributing it through his disciples. Everyone was satisfied, and twelve baskets of leftovers were collected.

Parish Scam Alert: Fraudulent Information Requests

We've been made aware of a scam currently targeting parishes in which an individual sends an email pretending to be someone known to the parish office (e.g., a staff member, priest, or volunteer). The email may request a copy of the parish directory or other lists in order to access personal contact information.

Important Warning Signs:

The email comes from an address that does not match the official address of the person named.

The message may have urgent or vague language asking for help or access to data.

What to Do:

Do not respond or provide any information.

Double-check the email address carefully—scammers often use similar-looking domains.

Report the email to your parish office and your IT support or diocesan communications office.

Do not click any links or download attachments from suspicious emails.
