Introduction:

All efforts to address the broken relationship between Indigenous Peoples and the Catholic Church need to begin by listening to Indigenous people - Elders and Knowledge Keepers, Survivors, Chiefs, youth, and whole communities. Chief Cadmus Delorme has commented frequently that Indigenous and Church people of today were not there when the Indian Act came into being, when Residential Schools were opened, when the harsh effects of colonization began to impact Indigenous Peoples. But we have all inherited this situation, and it is for us to rise to the occasion to be instruments of healing and reconciliation. As Church, part of that inheritance is the legacy of having been complicit in the removal of children from their homes, and depriving them of their language, culture, spirituality, and family life. We have a special responsibility to engage in the work of the truth and reconciliation process. We can do that in many ways, and there is a role for each of us to play. This resource is intended as a help to discerning what each person, each parish, each community might do on this journey.

It is our responsibility now to educate ourselves in order to walk the road together of right relationships, truth, justice and reconciliation. We offer a 3-fold way of entering into this: "**Education – Encounters – Experiences**."

While it is our responsibility to educate ourselves, and to use our voices and actions to become allies, Indigenous voices are needed in our decisions and steps forward. On this journey, we have embraced a simple saying that we learned from Indigenous friends, "nothing about us without us". Let us begin to have conversations and collaborate with Indigenous people and communities, walking side by side. Listening to the stories of residential school survivors, stories from the Elders, and Knowledge Keepers, participating in sharing circles, and going to cultural events like pow-wows, are enriching ways that we can also build right relations that lead to reconciliation.

Below is a list of some ideas that can help facilitate "Encounters & Experiences"

Please contact Sr. ReAnne Letourneau for further details, guidelines and protocols, as she works closely with members of the Indigenous community and will connect you with them when possible.

- Host a potluck and sharing circle with Indigenous and non-Indigenous people.
- Attend a cultural event: Pow Wow, Feast, Round Dance.
- Experience Indigenous culture through song and dance there are families and individuals who share on the meaning of the drum and their dances through Pow Wow demonstrations and teachings.
- If you wish to invite an Elder, Knowledge Keeper, survivor into your parish to share teachings and their experiences you must contact Sr. ReAnne Letourneau.

When we can enter into those honestly and truthfully, it can then move us beyond initial reactions and to start to do the real work of truth and reconciliation, in responding to the TRC Calls to Action.

We hope that this document will offer some recommendations. As large actions are being taken on by some, even small actions by many people can effect change that may seem impossible now but will in time prove beneficial to our relationships with Indigenous peoples. What action will you take today?

The fundamental principle is "relationships". People are longing for community; our parishes are in need of building communities that acknowledge and understand the true history of Indigenous Peoples, Canada, and non-Indigenous Peoples. Being involved in Indigenous Relations is an opportunity to get to know Indigenous peoples and ultimately getting to know the role of non-Indigenous peoples in that history. We can then create opportunities to encounter and have experiences together with Indigenous Peoples that build better relationships which ultimately lead to reconciliation...with families, communities, nations, and ourselves.
